# **RHH Briefing**Support the UK's road transport industry to keep Britain moving and drive growth



# Introduction and background

The road transport industry is critical to the UK supply chain and economic growth. It faces incredibly difficult pressures from unsustainable cost increases across wages, fuel, and energy, to shortages of drivers, technicians, vehicles, and parts.

Challenges brought about by the cost-of-living crisis have placed severe economic strain on road transport businesses – particularly small-to-medium enterprises (SMEs):

- Over the past 12 months, the costs of operating an HGV have increased by 20% while the price of fuel has risen by almost 40%
- Operators have seen their bills spike by 300-400% in 2022 compared to the previous year
- As a direct result of rising costs, many operators are running at a loss with margins wiped out by cost increases.

Soaring costs in this context are a key driver of inflation in the wider economy. This is ultimately being felt by consumers who are having to bear the brunt of higher prices – particularly when it comes to food – as transport businesses are forced to pass on increases in operating costs.

The current skills and facilities shortages in the road transport sector also continue to affect supply chains. Today, we estimate there to be a **50,000 shortage of drivers**, while many lack access to safe, secure parking and welfare facilities.

Adequate investment in the upkeep of roads is equally lacking, which is further impacting drivers' ability to effectively carry out their critical role.

In the upcoming Spring Budget, we are therefore calling on the Government to focus on stability, long-term growth and targeted support to tackle the major challenges the road transport industry currently faces.

### RHA's recommendations to Government

We recommend that the Government – specifically HM Treasury – commits to the following key measures in next month's Budget:

- Reduce the cost of fuel through tax relief, introducing a
  targeted essential user rebate of at least 15 pence per litre for
  commercial operators like HGVs and coach operators. This is an
  anti-inflationary measure comparable to the support provided
  for commercial vehicle operators in Spain, France and Ireland
   which will help ease fiscal pressures in the supply chain and
  reduce the rising cost of living for everyone.
- Commit to no increase in fuel duty for diesel for a further two years.
- 3. Continue the **freeze on Vehicle Excise Duty** to further ease costs for HGV and coach businesses.
- Reform the Apprenticeship Levy to provide greater flexibility for skills training, and ensure there is clear direction and timetables for the allocation of funding.
- 5. Confirm funding for additional places on HGV Skills Bootcamps.
- 6. Extend the National Skills Fund to include all training levels.
- Provide increased funding for safe and secure lorry parking facilities. Nationally, there is an estimated 11,000 shortage of lorry parking space. Freight crime is on the rise and, in 2021, £71.4 million worth of stolen goods from HGVs was recovered.
- Replace the HGV levy with an alternative scheme that ensures
  overseas operators coming to the UK contribute to the upkeep
  of vital road infrastructure. Road investment is vital if we are to
  keep supply chains moving.
